Surf's Up! Are you up?... Up on the facts of beach nourishment, that is?

What is Beach Nourishment?

- The preferred method to restore eroding beaches.
- Beach quality sand replaced on an eroding beach.

- Widening a beach and advancing the shoreline seaward.
- Wider beaches and sand dunes acting as naturally protective buffers a "surge protector."
- Mitigation of storm effects when additional sand is placed.

Approval:


By voter approval of referendum. The referendum will be on the November 2 General Election ballot. Only Captivans registered to vote on Captiva are eligible to vote on the referendum.

the address indicated on the form. The last day to request a Ballot by Mail by telephone is Tuesday, October 26.

<u>Early Voting</u> Early voting is available for any qualified voter who appears at a designated early voting site between October 18 and October 31.
